At the start of the school year, Vasile Turcan rallied funds for two Mac desktops, while Dr. Terry W. Dorsett secured a \$10,000 grant for 10 new Apple desktops. We were honored to welcome Dr. Terry Dorsett, Executive Director of the Baptist Churches of New England (BCNE), as a guest speaker in one of our recent Wednesday chapel services. Dr. Dorsett, gifted with a dynamic rapport with young people, delivered a powerful message that left a lasting impression on our students.

During the service, Dr. Dorsett engaged our students with an interactive biblical object lesson on the power of words. He invited student volunteers to participate in a demonstration, illustrating how once words are spoken, they cannot be taken back. Using a tube of toothpaste, students were tasked with squeezing out its contents, then challenged to be the first to put the toothpaste back into the tube. The comical yet profound exercise emphasized the importance of being mindful of our words and their impact on others.

## **KINDERGARTEN**



We are thrilled to share what's in store for our kindergarten students this month. You may have heard about the excitement in our classroom as we embark on our science journey. We have begun reading collectively from our science textbook titled "God's World." We've just completed our first chapter of how each child is intricately designed by God, equipped with five senses. We will progress to chapters covering "Types of Weather" and "Seasons." Students are continuing to expand their understanding of special sounds, and they have now advanced to three-letter special sounds, such as "spl" in splash. In Numbers, we've delved into the realm of word problems and explored how to compare numbers before and after 1–100. Additionally, students are mastering the skill of reading clocks by the hour, half-hour and quarter past.
